Breana Cearns won the Kids Best of Show.






are asking that you get us your name, branch of service, and dates served. Our 4th and

Sewer/Income Survey

Federal income statistics showed that Echo was higher than the 51% low to moderate income levels required to qualify for a \$1 million plus dollar grant for the sewer project. The state allowed the city to hire Portland State University to do an income survey as in 2007 we were well above 51%. This income survey put our income levels too high to qualify. As a result we lose out on the grants and residents will have to fund more of the sewer project through revenue bonds paid by increased sewer rates.



The income survey completed in September was just short of meeting the 51%. Some people refused to participate and others wouldn't respond to mailings or door to door visits. Possibly these households would have made a difference.

America in Bloom



Scores from this year's America in Bloom (AIB) evaluation were disappointing. Despite the many improvements such as installation of the two sculptures on Main Street, Restoration of the old mill site by the Bales at Echo Ridge Cellars,

renovation of the Masonic Lodge Interior and addition of more floral containers and benches, this years' judges gave a score (3 Blooms) at the level of our first year's entry in 2006.

Judges comments were full of praise, but scores were not. One of the disappointing parts of the Judges Report is that it gives little insight into why scores declined.

As a result, the City will not be entering AIB next year. We will continue our beautification and livability improvement efforts around Echo next year, which has been earning plenty of kudos from residents and visitors and hope our donors will continue to support our efforts through their donations of money and time and gain community pride from our accomplishments.

Your ideas for projects is appreciated. We did go down in residential points for floral and landscaping and noted many yards were not as well kept as before. Ideas to encourage residential pride in their homes and yards would be appreciated.

Our area of special recognition this year was Environmental Effort. The city worked with Oregon



Energy Trust on several projects which helped in this area and installed LED lights in the Masonic Lodge as part of the renovation. Other projects included installation of a Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) on Well 5 which "cleaned" up power and provided stable electricity while lowering the power bill at least 1/3. Main Street Lights were converted from Sodium Vapor to LED lights which is saving power, providing bright white lights and lower maintenance

charges.

Observations and Recommendations

"Echo is truly a unique small community with loads of charm and relaxed lifestyle. As long time America in Bloom participants (this is the ninth year of participation) Echo continues to compete in the ... Circle of Champions [Small Cities] As the community slowly grows, Echo continues to incorporate the recommendations from AIB judges and thrive. ...Two wineries are providing diversity in agriculture and will draw an increasing number of visitors. ...

Historic structures form the backbone of the charm found in Echo. Reuse and rehabilitation of these buildings continues and will be critical to the future success of Echo. Meanwhile, the incorporation and promotion of unique events such as the Red 2 Red Cycle Race and the car show attract new and returning visitors to the jewel of a town. A natural attraction to promote is Fort Henrietta Park's public access to the Umatilla River....Colorful plantings fill circular planters that anchor major intersections and gorgeous hanging baskets adorn lampposts. Collections of containers are clustered near city hall and the widely read newsletter, the Echo informs residents and businesses about interesting flowering plants and beautification efforts. Echo successfully provides floral color during the warm months. Extend the color into the cooler months by replanting containers with ornamental kale, mums and ornamental peppers. The railing planters [pond] are a good idea to add color at eye level...use shade plants like Whopper begonias or blue torenia.

Many groupings of planters in the downtown attract the eye well...Add planters with edibles...replace small galvanized planters with larger ones. Residential Floral points 7 of 15 compared to 11 of 15 in 2014 & 2015. (cont. Dec.)
