events that will start around the state on that date and continue throughout much of 2009.

Echo Projects

Take Care of Oregon Day. For Oregon's 150th, organizers are trying to arrange



the largest day of volunteerism ever held in the nation called Down by the Riverside. The date is Saturday, May 16. However as school is not in session on Saturday, the Echo School will contribute to the volunteer effort by holding its

3rd annual Community Cleanup Day on Thursday May 14. Each class will take on a project. Last year these included planting flowers in city parks, cleaning up the football field and school grounds and arboretum or placing bark in the museum garden.

Echo residents are invited to do their part on May 16 with a general community cleanup effort. Roadside cleanup, yard cleanup or painting for disabled or elderly residents or riverside cleanup. (continued page 2)

Oregon Reads 2009

You can still join the Oregon Reads Pro-

This is the first statewide community reading project. Oregonians are invited to read <u>Stubborn Twig</u> by Lauren Kessler, <u>Bat</u> <u>6</u> by Virginia Euwer Wolff and <u>Apples to</u> <u>Oregon</u> by Deborah Hopkinson and participate in Oregon Reads activities at libraries, schools, colleges and community centers.

On Tuesday Feb.10 at 10 am the Weekly Library Story Time will feature <u>Apples to Oregon</u>. After the librarian reads the book there will be a discussion following for parents and children, snacks & crafts.

Wednesday, February 11 at 7 pm there will be a book discussion on the three books. The discussions will also focus on a "Sense of Place"—the sense of identity and character of places, like Echo, Eastern Oregon & Oregon. Bring your thoughts, ancestral stories, comments, etc. Refreshments will be served. An afternoon discussion is scheduled for Thursday, February 12 at 3:30 pm in the library.






Backyard Bird Count

If you are interested in birds, you may want to join other fans across North America in the Annual Great Backvard Bird Count on February 13-16. This is a joint project of Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society. "This free event is an opportunity for families, students, and people of all ages to discover the wonders of nature in backyards, schoolyards, and local parks, and at the same time, make an important contribution to conservation." The bird counts can be reported online. Even if you can only iden-

tify a few species you can help. Even novice bird watchers can contribute by counting birds for as little as 15 minutes. The sightings can be reported at www.birdcount.org. and you can check out what



birds others are sighting. There is a bird photo gallery and tips for identifying birds.

A Big Thank You/Income Survey

Thank you to all the Echo residents who had the patience to provide information for the first & second income survey by GEODC. We just received a letter from the Oregon Community & Economic Development Department that Echo has 55+% low to moderate income households, which means we now qualify for a Block Grant of up to \$1,000,000 for the Sewer Upgrade Project. We have also re-

ceived word that the proposed Economic Stimulus Legislation may allow for larger grant awards to eligible communities for projects like




our sewer project through existing federal programs.

the second recipe in the series

Sour Cream Pie (Myrtle O'Brien)

This is a luscious rich pie. Mapleine makes the flavor quiet different than a traditional raisin pie, which has nutmeg.

1 c. sugar	¼ tsp. salt
1 c. sour cream	3 eggs
4 Tbsp. flour	1 tsp. baking
powder	
1 ½ tsp. Mapleine	1 c. raisins
1/3 c. powdered sugar	

Cook raisins in water. Mix sugar & flour together with salt, sour cream & one whole egg & 2 beaten egg yolks. Add Mapleine. Cook all together in a double boiler until thick. Lastly add raisins and fill a baked pie shell. Cover with meringue made from 2 remaining egg whites. Add powdered sugar & baking powder gradually to meringue as eggs are whipped. Brown meringue in oven.

Transportation Stimulus

The City has submitted two projects for economic stimulus funding. Projects had to be submitted by Jan. 30 and had to be ones that could go to start construction within 6 months or less. Now we wait to see if the funding is approved & if so to be selected.

The Echo projects include a general roadwork project that would overlay the sections of city streets that have not been repaved since the 1940s or 50s and to widen roads in commercial areas. The second project would extend the Thielsen Street Bike paths and sidewalks north toward Willow Street.
