Tradition of Beautification

Around 1910 the ladies of Echo who belonged to the Needlecraft Club sold tags to earn money to buy trees to place along Echo's streets. Then business people carried buckets of water across the street to the park behind city hall to make sure the new Locust Trees thrived.

In a 1932 "Echo News" article is an-

"Residents in the district in the eastern part of town are making a wonderful improvement on their property. New lawns have been put in at the Litsey place and at Lee Pearson's, and flower and vegetable gardens along the street add much to the appearance of the neighborhood. Along the highway Mr. Bard has transformed a former weed patch into a good alfalfa

field and has set out s h a d e trees..

Mr. Cunha is now having the old scouring mill build-



ings torn down and he contemplates leveling the ground and seeding it to alfalfa. Mr. Luciani has the tract south of the Echo Mill property (Fox Hollow) leveled and seeded..."

Dog Licenses

Residents who have not purchased a 2009 license for their dogs are subject to a penalty of

\$10 per month for each month the licensing is delayed.

Through March license fees are \$14.00 per year for an altered animal and \$22 per year for an unaltered animal unless you are a new resident (less than two weeks) or have a new dog. Proof of a current rabies shot is required.



Park & Skatepark

A State Parks grant to provide the bulk of funding for the Skatepark and other park improvements is due April 1.. The city was on the alternate list last year, but the projects ahead of us on the list were able to secure the funding to go forward with their projects.



To be in a good position, the city needs to secure as much funding as a match as possible. A \$2000 anonymous dona-

tion received in February is a major help. The Echo School Shop Class is also working on a fundraiser for the project.



As well as a 6000 s.f. concrete skatepark, the project will provide a covered picnic shelter w/kitchen facilities, a restroom and playground.

The grant program provides extra points for projects that provide "Natural Play areas" to encourage inactive youth to play outdoors. The skatepark retention basin area will be made into a natural play area through addition of boulders and logs instead of grass. The access to the river will be improved, giving children better access to one of the greatest "natural" play areas. We don't have to create sandy or rocky areas or mud and water for children to splash in or boulders to crawl over, its there already.

Organizers of the first Red to Red Mountain Bike Race in Echo were more than pleased with the turn out. Over 175 cyclists from around the northwest participated in the first race of the season which started on Main

Street and went to the Piercy Mountain Bike Trail southwest of town and back.

Profits from the race went to the Echo Kiwanis for youth projects.

Community Benefit Fund

If you have been following the local newspapers, you have heard of the Community Benefit Fund that may soon come to Echo as a result of the Echo Wind Farms project. Four of the five tax districts (Echo Fire District, Echo Cemetery District, Port of Umatilla, Vector Control and Umatilla County Special Library District) have to agree to the concept developed by Umatilla County Commissioner that would create a



benefit fund with a board of directors who would give out funds each year in a grant format. Tammy Williams and Commissioner Dennis Do-

herty have been working hard to create this program and with the help of Chet Prior have received approval from the Fire, Cemetery & Port.

The Vector Control Board and Library District have not yet approved the program. Those interested can contact Ken Reading at the library district to tell him of your support for this program at 276-6449 or Vector Control Chairman David Trott (c/o City of Umatilla).

While all of the details will not be finalized until the program is approved, in communities like Helix, Milton-Freewater & Athena the funds have been granted to

school, governmental and non-profit organizations in their communities to fund projects like an ambulance, library improvements, school projects or trips, building roofs, heat systems and youth programs. It is estimated that for the first few years the distribution would be around \$75,000. The program will last for 15 years with funding declining to around \$40,000 in the final years.

Wastewater Project Bond

The Federal Economic Stimulus Package and the city's qualification for a Block Grant places the proposed wastewater project in the best financial position, Brad Baird of Anderson Perry & Associates, said he has seen in years. More funding is expected to be coming into programs like Block Grants and Rural Development from federal stimulus legislation.

The wastewater project will require voters to approve a bond issue. The council is planning to have the issue on the ballot for the May election. However with possible grants of \$1.5 million from Rural Development and Oregon Economic Development Department, residents will be looking at costs closer to \$48 per month for sewer rather than the \$65 that was estimated at first.

The City council is asking for input from residents on their preferences for funding the project. The \$48 (equivalent) can be all monthly wastewater billing, all property taxes or a combination of the two.

The Council will discuss the project further at a special meeting, Thursday, March 12

at 7:30 pm at city hall.

The city is currently operating on a DEQ Memorandum (MAO), which provides relief



from fines for daily operations that violate DEQ regulations, but the MAO will soon expire and if the city doesn't bring the wastewater system into compliance with new and in-

creasingly strict environmental regulations, DEQ will begin assessing hefty fines.

Additionally leaking transmission lines in the southeast quadrant of town are allowing penetration of ground water from the leaking Feed Canal to infiltrate the system. The inflow causes the wastewater influent to increase from 30,000 to 40,000 per day to over 100,000 gallons per day. This throws off the lagoon system wastewater breakdown process as well as adding huge costs for testing, chlorine and pumping and reduces the system's capacity for potential growth.

January-Araby Spice Cake February-Sour Cream Pie

Portuguese Bean Soup (Darlene "Fritz" Ramos)

1 lg. ham hock
2 medium onions, sliced
2 c. chicken stock
2 Linguica sausage
4 carrots, sliced
2-8 oz cans tomato
sauce

3-15 ½ oz. cans kidney beans 4 medium potatoes, cubed Salt & pepper

Cook ham hock & sausage in broth. Cool & add all the vegetables, except beans. Add juice from beans & cook. Add beans last, after vegetables are done. This recipe was in the Fort Henrietta Days Cookbook.

Spring Clean-up

The annual Sanitary Disposal Spring Cleanup week is scheduled from April 1 through April 7 this year. During this week, **cash** customers using the Sanitary Disposal



Transfer Station will receive up to a \$12.50 discount off of each load.

This means loads measuring 2.5 cubic yards with a maximum weight of 454.5 lbs. can be disposed of free of charge. This includes all acceptable solid waste with the exception of tires,

which will be charged at the regular rate.

The transfer station is located two miles north of Hermiston on Hwy. 395 across from The Lift Co. Inc. It is open weekdays from 8 am to 5 pm and weekends from 9 am to 5 pm.

Church Youth Visit
