Red to Red

The 2nd Annual Red to Red Mountain Bike Race will be Saturday, March 6. The



race will start on M a i n Street in front of the Red Express at 11 am. Registration will

begin at 8:30 am. The race will end on Dupont Street between the post office and George Park. As a result, for safety reasons, parking in front of the post office will be blocked off before racers return to town. The first Red to Red drew over 175 cyclists plus their family and friends. At least that many cyclists are expected this year.

The course will run up Main Street across the bridge to Snow Road and on to the Echo West Vineyard/Sno Road Winery MTB Trail System southwest of town and back.

The Echo Kiwanis Club helps with the race and as a result organizers donate profits from the race to the Echo Kiwanis for youth projects.

Big Top the Clown



Spring Clean-up

It is time to haul off all of the debris that has accumulated over the last year. The annual Sanitary Disposal Spring Cleanup week is scheduled from April 1 through April 7. During this week, **cash** customers using the Sanitary Disposal Transfer Station will receive up to a \$12.50 discount off of each load.

This means loads measuring 2.5 cubic yards with a maximum weight of 454.5 lbs. can be disposed of free of



charge. This includes all acceptable solid waste with the exception of tires, which will be charged at the regular rate.



Yard Debris

Yard Debris such as limbs, grass and leaves can be hauled to the transfer station and will be accepted free of charge year round if you are a customer and obtain a copy of a debris slip from city hall. The City of Stanfield will also allow clean yard debris and limbs to be deposited at their composting site. Take Coe Street to Hoosier Lane and turn right.

The transfer station is located two miles north of Hermiston on Hwy. 395 across from The Lift Co. Inc. It is open weekdays from 8 am to 5 pm and weekends from 9 am to 5 pm.

Dog Licenses

The fee for Dog Licenses increased by \$10 March 1 to \$14 for a neutered or spayed dog and \$22 for an unaltered



dog. The fee will increase another \$10 for each month the licensing is delayed.

Puppies do not need to be licensed until 6 months old. New dogs must be licensed within 2 weeks. Be sure and let the city clerk know if your dog is a puppy or new and she will not charge the penalty and will prorate the license fee.

Echo Hills

Membership rates remain the same as last year. A special rate is available for those living within the Echo City Limits, as Echo residents pay city property taxes.

Justice in Frontier Oregon



Oregon Historian Diane Goeres-Gardner will present Justice in Frontier Oregon, 1851-1905 on Monday, March 15 at 6:30 pm at City Hall, 20 S. Bonanza.

The program will provide information on Oregon's frontier executions, where thousands of people congre-

gated for these events. Also about early women criminals and convicts. The names of many involved now dot Oregon's landscape and history. The program will discuss the evolution of punishment and changing attitudes from hanging of Native Americans for the Whitman Massacre to 1905 when the last execution in Oregon outside of a state penitentiary took place.

This a *Sense of Place* Program presented by Echo Public Library and Libraries of Eastern Oregon (LEO). Goeres-Gardner is the author of <u>Necktie Parties</u>. A copy of the book can be checked out at the library.

within the city limits, at least one library board member can reside within the Echo Library Service area which corresponds with the school district boundaries.




The library board will meet once per quarter and the budget committee normally meets once or twice between mid April & June. The Tree Board meets about once per year.

Smart Investing

Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) has provided funding to bring a program called "Smart Investing @ your library."
