Red to Red MTB

The Echo Kiwanis is hosting several events during the Red to Red Cycle race on March 12. The Hermiston Rotary Club is donating the use of their food trailer and the Kiwanis will serve a Pancake

breakfast for \$5 from 8 to 10 am. For lunch, starting at 11:30 am,

they will serve a baked potato with Chili for \$5.

Big Top, the former Barnum and Bailey Clown, will perform in the church basement from 11 am to 1 pm. The show is free, but canned goods for the Kiwanis' monthly food basket program are welcomed.

Proceeds of the event will help fund the clown show and Kiwanis Scholarships. The Kiwanis Club is soliciting donations for the scholarship fund now. Last year 6 \$1000 scholarships were awarded, and the number

Golf Course Vandalism

On January 2 and 14 vandals stole and wrecked golf carts and damaged the golf course grounds, flag poles and tee markers. However the three youth were caught thanks to tips received from members of the community. The tipsters will receive a \$500 reward from the city and golf course men's club. The city has a standard policy of providing up to a

\$100 fine for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any one damaging public policy. These tips lead to the recovery of other stolen property.

Farm Equipment

Donations or loan of Vintage Farm Equipment or wagons for the display at the northend of town are being sought. Signage identifying the equipment will be added this summer and a grant is being sought for paint

to restore the equipment to original colors.

Items currently on display include:

A Deere Seeder, Iron



Age Potato Planter, Fahr Sickle Mower, IHC dump rake & manure spreader, potato planter, Eversman Automatic Leveler, 2 Fresnos, a Buck scraper, hay stacker, 2 sets of wooden wagon wheels with axles. Most of the

equipment dates from the early 1900s to 1930s.

Koontz Bldg. Restoration

The Koontz Building will soon join the

ranks of City Hall, the Echo B a n k Building (museum) and the Teel Building as a beautifully





restored examples of historic Eastern Oregon Architecture.

These improvements along with the Downtown up-

grades that will begin in about 6 months with a Transportation Enhancement Grant & grant from the Echo Community Benefit Fund will make Echo's downtown shine.

The Piercy's are moving forward rapidly with repairs to the exterior of the building. The plans include restoring the storefront to look very similar to that shown in the picture above.

The Koontz Building will house the Sno Road Winery tasting room, an event center and more.

The Piercy's are also nearing completion of offices and the apartment in the Mercantile Building. The Merc was built prior to 1910 and the Koontz Building was town founder JH Koontz' second store. It later was operated by Koontz' son in law Charles Miller and his partner Fred George as the George & Miller Co.

Community Garden

Accountability Board

The Stanfield Police are organizing a Community Accountability Board to deal with juvenile offenses in Echo and Stanfield.

The accountability board is made up of five local community representatives who vol-

unteer their time to meet with juvenile offenders who have been referred for diversion. under the direction of one of the Stanfield Police Officers. The Board determines the reasonable requirements for juveniles to perform for irresponsible behavior such as community service, counseling and restitution.

One goal is to impress on the offender the connection between the offender's behavior and its impact on the commu-

nity and the offender. This board usually will deal with first time offenders and those involved in minor infractions. Such programs have been very successful in other communities & tend to hold the offender responsible to his own community rather than being a number in the state juvenile system.

Skatepark Behavior

The City has been receiving complaints about behavior at the Skatepark, such as use of obscenities and loud music. The park closes at 8 pm and you will be cited if caught in the park after hours. Please be considerate



of those living around the skatepark and show restraint in your language and use of musical equipment. If problems persist, the city may choose to ban offenders from the park or close the park to encourage self-policing by users. We ask parents to share this information with their children.

Littering has decreased and we appreciate efforts by a **few** of the park users to pickup the litter left by others, but we ask you to pickup litter on the streets and yards near the skatepark.
