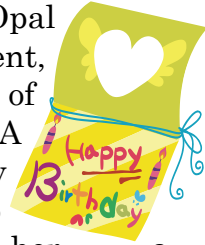

About L-Net: Librarians online work at libraries all over Oregon. Evenings, weekends, and early mornings you will be connected to librarians **all over the United States**. You may also be connected to a librarian from outside Oregon if L-net is busy. The person you are talking to may not be local, but will still be able to help you.

What kinds of questions can I ask? Librarians will try to answer any genuine question you think of. If you are a student and you have a homework question, librarians will try to help you find resources that help, but will not be able to answer your question for you.

Abandoned Vehicles

The city and police department are beginning the annual crack down on abandoned vehicles. If you have a vehicle that is on the road right-of-way (ROW) or is in your yard which is unlicensed and/or inoperable, this is considered an abandoned vehicle. Vehicles on the ROW will receive a 24 hour tag and those on private property will have a 72 hour tag. If the engine runs, but the vehicle is up on blocks, it is considered inoperable.

To recognize participation in the Community in Bloom Program, free packets of seeds grown in Oregon were provided those

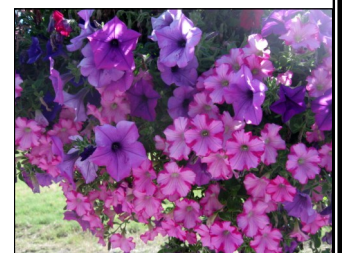

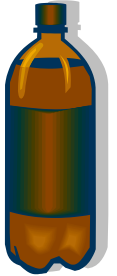


Story/Craft Time
