## **Echo Benefit Fund**

The Echo Community Benefit Fund Board met on August 6 to consider proposals for projects/grants from Echo area nonprofits, the city and school district. The gollowing awards were granted:

# The Library

Librarian Wendy Holben has resigned and the city hopes to begin interviewing for her replacement soon. While the library is short staffed, Wednesday evening hours will be reduced and will close at 8 pm. Special thanks to Jeanie Hampton for volunteering her services to keep us from being buried with returned materials.

### Success Story

We our very proud of our library and hope you are too. Not a week goes by when at least one visitor doesn't comment on the beauty and atmosphere of our library, but the success of our library is supported by statistics. Each Oregon Library is required to file a report with the Oregon State Library with information on circulation, its collection, budget and staffing.

In the 2010-11 fiscal year Echo Library checked out 9,798 items (books, videos, audio books, etc.). That is equal to 9.89 items per capita. Only the Ukiah library, which is a combination school and city library had a higher circulation rate at 28.935 volumes per capita (12,500 items\432 population). Third was Athena at 6.31 items per capita. In comparison Pendleton checked out 127,549 items, but with a service population of 23,266 this meant 5.48 per capita. This year our circulation increased dramatically to 11,432 items or 11.59 items per capita. We also have to track public computer use, which is also higher than most other small libraries.

Our interlibrary loans to other libraries are amongst the highest per capita with 689 items checked out compared to 166 we borrowed from others. This probably due to the size and range of our collection. Our library has over 16,000 items despite ongoing, extensive weeding. The closest library collection to ours among the small libraries in the district is Athena with 12,225 items.

### Sage System

As well as being part of the Umatilla County Public Library, our library is a member of the Eastern Oregon Library Consortium called sage. Through Sage all of the public libraries, colleges and most school libraries in Eastern Oregon, Hood River County list their materials on a combined searchable database and exchange materials through a courier system between libraries.

#### **Donations**

The size and breadth of our library collection is primarily because of the donations our library receives from the community. We appreciate this and try to recognize such donations each month.
