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Rabies Clinic

Country Animal Hospital isholding a Rabies Vaccine Clinic at the Masonic Lodge, 20 S. Dupont on Saturday March 16 from 1 to 3 pm. The

cost is discounted to \$19.25.

The City is waiving the \$10 late charge for dog licenses not purchased before March 1 for anyone getting their license at the clinic. City Clerk Peggy Haines will be there to issue the licenses. The cost of a license is \$4 for a spayed or neutered dog and \$12 for an unaltered one.

If you have already licensed your dog, but the rabies vaccine is about to expire you may want to take advantage of this discount.

Political Signs

As the result of problems with stolen signs and complaints regarding political signs, the city is enforcing the sign code regarding political



signs (9-14-5D). All political signs will need to be taken down immediately and not replaced until 30 days prior to the election which is on May 21 and must be removed within 14 days of the election. The signs can only be two (2) feet square and must be on private property, not on the street right of way.

CLEAN-UP WEEK

Sanitary Disposal, Inc. will host the annual Spring Clean-up week from April 1 through 7, 2013 at the Sanitary Disposal Transfer Station. During this week, cash customers using the Transfer Station will receive up to a \$13.50 discount off of each load.

This means, loads measuring up to 2.5 cubic yards with a maximum weight of 454.5 lbs can be disposed of free of charge. This includes all acceptable solid waste with the exception of tires. Tires will be charged at the regular rate.

The transfer station is located two miles north of Hermiston on Hwy 395 across from the Lift Company, Inc. It is open weekdays from 8 am to 5 pm and weekends from 9 am to 5 pm

Most of the materials are found in the 635 through 635.9 classification numbers and in 712 & 716 numbers.

Easter Egg Hunt


The annual Easter Egg Hunt be on Saturday, March 30th at 9 am. The hunt will be held in three locations depending on age groups:

City News

Tree Corner

The City of Echo will celebrate its 24th year as a Tree City USA on Thursday, April 18 in the Park. The TREE CITY USA° public is invited as well as Echo Elementary Students.

For this year's Tree City Program the city will again offer a large caliper tree as a grand door prize.

50/50 program: The 50/50 program will return this year after being discontinued for several years. The city will purchase 10 1 to 2 gallon trees and residents can buy them at a 50% discount. This is usually about \$15 to \$20 per tree. The trees will be provided on a first come first serve basis and the varieties available will be listed next month.

New Home Owner Program. It has been three years since the city provided new trees to new homeowners. If you have purchased a new home and occupy it (this doesn't apply to rentals), please let the city clerk know that you are interested in a tree. Again the varieties will be available next month.

Official Echo Tree: The Red

Horsechestnut was selected as the official city tree in 2009 to commemorate the 20th city's Anniver-







sary as a Tree City USA. A Red Horsechestnut was planted in the center of the George

Park that April and a brass plaque commemorates the event and the state's 150th birthday. The photo on the previous page is of the Red Horsechestnut that was planted in the George Park about



ten years ago. Another Red Horsechestnut was planted in 2011 to honor the victims of the 9-11 attack on the 10th year following that event.

Red Horsechestnuts (Aseculus x carnea Briotti' or Fort McNair) also grow in the Arboretum and at the golf course. The exotic looking salmon colored flowers with the yellow throats probably contributed to the selection of this tree as the official Echo Tree. It will grow 30 to 40 feet high and 25-30 feet wide. It has a rounded form and flowers are on 4-5" stalks that stick up above the leaves. The leaves can be subject to scorched edges during hot summer winds, at least for the first few years. It likes moist, but well-drained soil, so don't place it where water is limited.

Research on Dying Trees

This research may help locally with damage to Locust by Locust Borers and Walnut by 1000 Cankers disease, if scientists can figure out why some trees die under adverse conditions and others survive. "Without better understanding the mechanisms of tree death, it is not possible to reliably predict when and where the next massive die-offs will occur on this planet," he said.
