

Reading Meters

The final meter reading for this season was in October. Water meters can be insu-

lated now. Please only use a small grocery size sack of leaves or insulation in the meter box.

Your December, January, February and March utility bills will be the minimum charge as we don't read meters during the winter. Meters will be read in mid March and your April bill will include usage above the 3000 gallon per month minimum. The overage charge will be for usage above 15,000 gallons.

Judges Comments: "George Park, located next to the town building is an attractive example of a land-scaped area. Plant selections ensure blooming will take place at different times throughout the season. Maturing trees provide shaded spots in some areas while still allowing adequate sunny ones. The pergola, pond, fountain and other hard landscaping features add interest."

"The Fifes have done a fabulous job of landscaping at the Koontz House using a great variety of plants, statuary and fountain"

"The newly installed benches, bike racks and horse hitching posts located throughout the business district add greatly to the frontier theme of the building architecture."

"Henrietta Park is a shaded cool summer oasis where in spring daffodils highlight the park. The Umatilla River borders the park and has limited accessibility. Local kids enter the river through worn paths to swim and cool off in the river. The park is also home to historic reproductions of the former jail [note jail is original not a reproduction], blockhouse as well as an enclosed covered wagon display...Recommendation: Hostas planted among the daffodils will provide cover as daffodil leaves die down and will be attractive the rest of the season.

Recommendation: Future fence at the skatepark: make a wall that youth can paint, to make outdoor art which can be repainted from time to time.

The Cemetery is well maintained and the view of town is stupendous. **Recommend:** Plant colorful flowers along the drive up to the Veteran's Memorial for a visual impact.
