Echo Museum

Echo Museum memberships are up for renewal this month. This year the board has been working to arrange displays to better reveal the architecture

of the building. Historic photos were scanned and placed on disks. The Fort Henrietta Foundation donated a large format digital frame so visitors can browse through photos.

Rick and Pat Rebman donated an historic Steinway Style 1, 1867 Square-style Baby Grand Piano. This piano was originally shipped to Portland soon after construction, probably around the Horn as the railroads were not completed at that point. The piano is on display in the Koontz Building/ Sno Road Winery Event Center.

This year the museum also received the donation of some very special items relative to the history of Echo and Umatilla County. Descendents of Oscar and Susan Thomson donated a branding iron, pistol, badge and other items that are now on display in the Museum. Oscar F. Thomson was the third county sheriff and 2nd county sheriff, following Frank Maddock who farmed where the Cunha Farmstead is today. O.F. was



one of the first settlers in the county c. 1864, first running a pack teams from then freighting business with RN Stanfield out of Umatilla Landing. In the 1870s her and Stanfield settled on Butter Creek where he was an innovator in irrigation. The Thomson house was moved from Butter Creek to Echo in the 1970s and is the home on Dupont Street across from the Fife-Koontz House.

This coming year the museum will be working with the city to try to achieve All Star Heritage Community status and as part of this we are trying to raise money to join the University of Oregon's Oregon Digital Newspaper project. The museums collection of historical newspapers, which are becoming



very fragile will not only be preserved,

but will be available online in a searchable format. Newspapers such as the East Oregonian are already online at <u>http://oregonnews.uoregon.edu/</u>

If you are interested in helping preserve our rich history, you might want to consider joining. Membership allows free access to the museum all year long. Donation Tax Credits

The Fort Henrietta Foundation & Echo Historical Museum have been accepted by the Oregon Cultural Trust as eligible cultural organizations. This means you can make a donation the Fort Henrietta Foundation or Echo Museum and a matching gift to the Cultural Trust and become eligible for an Oregon cultural tax credit. The list of qualified organizations and information on the trust can be found at www.culturaltrust.org.

How to Participate

Make a donation to the Oregon Cultural Trust. The cultural tax credit is generous: up to \$500 for individuals, \$1,000 for couples filing jointly, \$2,500 for corporations. And when you add up the deductions and credit, at the federal and state levels, the tax savings for cultural giving are impressive.

To claim your tax credit you simply make a matching gift or gifts – same or greater dollar amount – to any combination of cultural nonprofits in Oregon. If you're a member of a public broadcaster, an historical society or a museum of any kind, or if you're making cash donations to a library or school foundation, an art center or nonprofit gallery, a heritage organization or a performing arts group, you're eligible to make a matching gift to the Trust for which you may claim a 100% Oregon tax credit.

Oregon's unique cultural tax credit is a



powerful incentive. But the reason to give is to sustain and develop Oregon's arts, heritage and humanities. The Cultural Trust was designed to direct support to cultural nonprofits in a multitude of ways.

Tree Corner Winter Tree Care Tips

Winter brings frigid temperatures, icy winds and often snow. Just as people battle the Cold Winter Elements, so do trees, but

trees can't seek a warm house. "While your trees seem to be in a state of hibernation in the winter, exposure to the tough winter conditions can cause them major stress," says Jim Skiera, Ex. Dir. of the International Society of Aboriculture (ISA). "Minimize that stress by helping your trees through



cold months, a little at a time. If you take care of your trees in the winter, you'll be rewarded in the spring."

1. Put composted organic mulch under your trees in the fall or early winter to help retain water and reduce temperature extremes. This will act like a blanket.

2. Give your trees a drink. Your trees will benefit from water during winter droughts, if temperatures permit an ocassional watering during the winter. This can save young trees, but only do so when the soil is cool, but not frozen

3. Prune your trees. Winter is actually one of the best times to prune because you can see the trees structure without the leaves. Limit the pruning to deadwood and poorly placed branches.

4. Wrap trees with tree guards to protect them from gnawing animals & sunscald.

are considered community treasures. Echo's museums house artifacts of everyday living and working... China House is unique for its collection of items that are identified with the building of the

railroad and the expansion of a modern civilization. Additionally it tells the story of the everyday individuals who built the railroad. While the museum is run by a volunteer board they could use the assistance of a professional museum consultant for such tasks as recording collection artifacts, preserving techniques for wearable materials (paper, cloth....) docent training, and collection disposal. One resource to turn to might be the University of Oregon Museum Studies Department, Dr. Kingston Heath (541-346-2115, kwheath@uoregon.edu).

for technical assistance. Additionally the Main Street program of Oregon (www.oregon.gov/oprd/ HCD/SHPO/pages/mainstreet.asps) can be an additional resource for technical and financial assistance to investigate.

Fort Henrietta is a reproduction of the earliest civilization site for the town of Echo [Actually the fort (1855-56) is the 2nd site. Utilla Indian Agency (1851-55) was first & the park is across the river from the site of Utilla and Fort Henriettal. Located along the banks of the Umatilla River it has changed over the years from being an open site to one that has a park like setting with many mature trees... The Block House is an important part of the story of Echo. This wooden structure is showing signs of aging. Sill plates are softening and the building is leaning. While people do not go into the structure, the integrity is questionable. An assessment by someone knowledgeable in historic restoration of structures would be advisable.

The former Catholic Church now sitting abandoned might be an attractive addition to the community as a community center. While this is in the future it is not beyond a possibility. Investigate the purchase or donation of the property from the archdiocese [Property was donated to Fort Henrietta Fnd sometime ago.].
