America in Bloom Contests

As well as evaluating communities participating in AIB through judges visits, competitors (cities or individuals) can submit a portfolio of up to 18 photos of their community in the: **How Does Your Town Measure Up...**Photo Contest with sponsorship from <u>Home & Garden Showplace & Monrovia</u> <u>Nursery</u>.

The photos can be up to $8 \ge 12$ " and should focus on beautification efforts and should each have a label on the back which includes the town name, population and the name of the party submitting the photography. Each entry should include one paragraph of up to 50 words describing who was involved in the submission and photography.

Entries also may include numbered paragraphs corresponding



to numbered photos that provide information on the photo. Paragraphs should be limed to 25 words for each photo. Three \$1500 prizes will be awarded, one in each of three population groups: 1. under 50,000; 2. medium 50,001 to 249,999; 3. Over 250,000.

Animal Tethering

Chief Bryon Zumwalt has provided the following information on a new animal tethering law that went into effect January 2014. The law regulates how long a dog can be kept tethered during a 24 hour period. It also defines standards for shelter and bedding, but does not include use of a hand-held leash for the purpose of walking a dog,

*A dog can be on a tether no more than 10 hours in a 24 hour period or 15 hours if the tether is attached to a line, pulley or trolley.

*It forbids use of tethers which could entangle or endanger the animals and prohibits the use of pinch or choke collars.

*The law requires "adequate bedding" which keeps animals dry and reasonably clean and protects the animals from the elements and prevents injury. Crawl spaces, steps, decks, stoops, and the underside of vehicles are not shelters. Pet carriers and crates used



for transport or shelters that fall apart in the elements are not considered adequate shelter. Shelters with chain link floors are not acceptable. Animals cannot be kept in a vehicle for an extended period of time.

There are exemptions for dogs being used for hunting, dog sledding and protecting livestock. See House Bill 2783.

This is a Class B Violation, but if the tethering results in a physical injury to a dog would be a Class B misdemeanor, and tethering resulting in serious physical injury or death is a Class A misdemeanor.

Gardening Tips

In the Library is a great book called <u>50</u> <u>High-Impact, Low-Care Garden Plants</u> for those who want to improve their yard or garden without becoming a slave to it.

Listed below are some of the plants that do well in our area. This list also includes a few trees such as Paperbark Maple and Dwarf Rocky Mountain Fir. I have added a few that we have found to be very reliable perennials in our area.

Asters (annuals also do well also)

The old standby once called the New England Aster now comes in a variety of colors. The museum garden has a number of these.

Siberian bugloss, *Brunnera macrophylla*-shade loving.

Bleeding Heart, *Dicentra*, Look on Northside of city hall, shade loving.

Geranium/Cranesbill. This isn't the Geraniums in reds and pinks you see in pots, this is a tough perennial that like partial sun or morning sun. Very Adaptable and great for rock gardens.

Hosta, the there are numerous hostas available with many variations in foliage. Shade Loving/morning sun, great foundation plant.

Iris. Check out the variety of reblooming Iris on the market. You can't hardly kill an Iris, but the dead blooms and stems need pruned back.

Honeysuckle/*Lonicera*. Honeysuckle does so well, here that we haven't even had to plant it. Several Honeysuckle vines have shown up
