Puncture Vine Bounty

Puncture vine/goat head season is here. As soon as the weather heats up, this pest starts its explosive growth. Last year the city, following the lead of the Cities of Boardman



& the Dalles, paid out a \$1 per sack bounty for each grocery-size sack full of puncture vines turned in at city hall.

We are offering the bounty again this year with \$1 for each small grocery-size sack or \$5 per 5 gallon bucket full of vines turned in. A voucher will be issued for each bag and paid out in increments of \$25 or after the last sack is turned in, if less than \$25 is earned. The bags must be turned in at city hall during regular business hours. The bounty will be provided until a \$350 budget is reached.

Burnt Leather Cake

Caramel: Two-thirds cup of sugar; put on stove and let cook until dark brown; add one-half cup water and cook thick like molasses. Be careful of burning. Cake: One and one-half cups sugar, one-half cup butter, three eggs, separated, one-half cup water, three tablespoons caramel, two teaspoons vanilla, three flat teaspoons Crescent baking powder, mixed in two and one-half cups flour. Beat whites to a froth, and bake in layers. Filling: One and one-half cups of sugar, two-thirds cup water. Boil until it threads. Pour over beaten whites of two eggs. Add one tablespoon caramel and one teaspoon vanilla, and beat until creamy.
