

Cleanup Week

Sanitary Disposal's Annual Free Cleanup week is April 1 thru 7 for cash customers in good stand-



ing. Customers will receive up to a \$13.50 discount on each load. This means loads measuring up to 2.5 cubic yards with a maximum weight of 454 1/2 lbs. can be disposed of free of charge. This includes all acceptable solid waste with the exception of tires, which will be charged at the regular rate.

The transfer station is located 2 miles north of Hermiston on the West side of Hwy 395. It is open weekdays from 8 am to 5 pm and weekends from 9 am to 5 pm.

Door to Door Sales

Reports of Door to Door Salesmen working the area, not only in Echo but around the region, have been increasing. Some of the salesmen have been persis-



tent, rude and aggressive. The city has an ordinance requiring door to door salesmen to obtain a solicitor's license before working in Echo. The license is not required if the company is visiting established customers, but is for Tree Services (additional licensing and insurance required), door to door food sales, vacuum sales, etc.

If salesmen come to your door, be sure and ask to see their Business License or Solicitor's Permit from the City of Echo. If they cannot produce one, please call city hall 541-376-8411 during business hours or county dispatch at 541-966-3651 and provide information such as vehicle type to the dispatcher to give to the police.

Dog Licenses

Dog Licenses for **2016** are now overdue and a \$10 **penalty will be assessed** for licenses obtained after Feb. 29. The penalty will increase to \$20 April 1, and another \$10 each month thereafter.

Warnings will be issued this month and **citations** for failure to license your dog will be issued in **April**. If you no longer have your dog, please contact the city clerk ASAP so she can remove the animal from our records, 541-376-8411.

If you are a new resident you have two weeks to license your animal to avoid a late fee and your license will be pro-rated. If you obtain a new dog, please let the clerk know so she can pro-rate your license and doesn't charge a penalty.

Please let her know if you have preferences such as size variety, etc. This provides an idea of preferred trees, but depending on availability, we may not be able to accommodate you, but we will try. The cost is usually \$17 to \$24.

The trees **must be** planted within the Echo city limits. We will also do a cooperative order this year if you need more than 1 tree, others, such as those outside the city, but in the school district can order for the full cost of the tree plus freight. This is still a dis-



counted price as we are able to order at wholesale costs.

Walking Path

Last month we asked for comments on development of a walking path through or around town. Feedback was limited.

This lead to another concept as the separate path will be expensive to install and to maintain with limited use. We have an ODOT grant to install a sidewalk, bike paths and way stations along Thielsen Street from Main Street north to Cemetery Rd. One option being considered is setting out a route from the Arboretum to Thielsen Street then North to the Cemetery. A couple of benches could be installed near the cemetery for resting and viewing. A couple of warm-up/adult exercise stations could be placed at the beginning of the course. It would be about 2 mi. to the cemetery and back and at least 2.5 mi. to walk through the cemetery & back.
