PSU has sent out two mailings and has gone door to door over the last two months trying to gather the required number of completed surveys, but are still short the number needed. A phone survey is the next attempt to gather the needed information.

Tree Art

The First piece of art purchased through grants and donations to the Echo



Public Art Project went up earlier last month. Douglas Gisi, artist, helps the

city crew guide the art to its home in the garden in front of the old service station. This piece celebrates the history of Trees in Echo's History and our 27 years as a Tree City USA.

A second piece by Gisi will be placed in front of the old Echo Hotel and will celebrate Farming and Transportation in Echo History.

These two pieces of art were funded from grants from the Kinsmans Foundation, Umatilla County and Echo Community Benefit Fund. Private donations also have provid-

ed over \$2000 toward public Art.

The art will be dedicated and signage installed in July at the America in Bloom Judges Reception.

Donors names will ap-



pear on the sign. Any donations toward Echo Public Art received by the end of **April** will be listed on the signage.

Echo's School Art Program is working on two additional art projects for the downtown. The wheat sculpture donated in memory of the Penney & Rauch Families by Chris Rauch will be reinstalled this spring. A new base that can be bolted to the sculpture so it doesn't fall over will soon be reinstalled.

More Art: Other Art Projects have been identified by the Echo Art Committee and will be installed as funding is obtained.

<u>What not to Bring</u>: Ammunition, fireworks, explosives, infection and biological waste, prescription medicines/syringes, radioactive waste, tires, unknown compressed gas cylinders or unsorted solid waste.

What to Bring: adhesives, glues, resins, hobby supplies, artist supplies, oil paints, latex

paints, thinners, stains, strippers, polishes, stains, car batteries, dry cell batteries, engine degreasers, brake fluids, antifreeze, AC refrigerants, transmission fluid, motor oil, waste fuels, (diesel & gas), Insecticides, weed killers, poisons, pesticides, fungicides, propane tanks or cylinders, swimming pool chemicals, wood preservatives, driveway sealer, aerosol cans, lighter fluid, cleaners, spot removers, bleach, computers, electronic equipment, batteries, photo chemicals, chemistry sets, home heating oil, thermometers, fluorescent light bulbs, kerosene.

To Ensure Safety: Never Mix Chemicals, Never smoke while handling hazardous materials, Do not place waste in plastic garbage cans. Tighten lids, Pack in boxes with newspaper packing, Pack paint, pesticides and household cleaners separately.
