The City of Echo and Echo Kiwanis' Chester's Pantry are organizing the nual Christmas Basket Program for Needy ECHO families, Echo Boosters, the School, and Echo Community Church are also helping

with the annual Christmas Food Drive again this year. Canned and packaged foods (Please no home canned or perishables except for fresh potatoes, onions or carrots) can be dropped at city hall. Students will also be collecting food. The City of Echo and other local agencies have been coordinating the annual Food Baskets for Needy Families and Giving Tree Toy Drive for over 37 years. Food and toys are provided to residents of Echo Only and only one Food Basket & turkey per household Food Baskets may be picked up Wednesday, Dec. 20 between 4 and 5:00 pm at the Masonic Lodge, 20 S Dupont. If you need to have the food delivered, let the city clerk know when you fill out the application.

If you need a food basket and/or Giving Tree gifts (children must be under 17) you need to come by city hall during business hours at 20 S. Bonanza and fill out an application before Dec. 15 at 3:30 p.m.

**Delivery** for those who sign up for home delivery will be the morning of **Thursday**, **December 21**. Gifts from the Giving Tree for children will be delivered at the same time. The collection point for donations of food, toys (new or like new only please) and

cash is city hall.

As well as dropping donations at city hall, you can also mail donations to PO Box 9, Echo, OR 97826. Cash donations are used to purchase turkeys and perishables such as milk, butter, bread and celery and for gifts for children who's names are left on the Giving Tree.

Food and toys can be donated through the school food and toy drive or dropped by city hall. Please provide **donations** by **Monday. Dec. 18 at 10 am**.

Even if you normally pick up food at the Kiwanis' Chester's Food Pantry each month, you still need to fill out the application at city hall for Christmas/December ahead of time so we can have enough food and turkeys available. If you know a family in town who you feel needs the food basket or gifts, please contact city hall on their behalf.

This replaces the regular Kiwanis Chester's Food Pantry for December each year only.

Chester's Food Pantry honors the late Chester Prior who worked diligently to get the program started through the Echo Kiwanis. Funds from the Bob Hale Memorial Fund with-



#### **Annexation Code**

The City Council adopted a new code at their October meeting that establishes procedures for annexation of property located in the city's Urban Growth Boundaries. The application for seeking annexation was adopted at the November meeting and the council will be looking at a System Development Charge Ordinance at the December 14 council meeting. Land must be in the Urban Growth Boundary established in 1979 to be eligible for annexation.

The System Development Charge Ordinance provides for a methodology for figuring out the cost existing users of city services/ utilities have paid into the systems over the years such as through General Obligation Bond payments to finance the system development. Any new developments will have to pay a fair share of these costs.

Once the System Development Study is completed, the city will be required to give notice and hold a public hearing on the proposed charges before final adoption.

#### FOG in Sewer

Just a reminder, please do not dump FOGs (Fats, oils and grease) into the toilet or dump down your drain.



When fats, oils, and grease are poured or flushed down your sinks, drains, or toilets they enter the sewer system where they cool, harden and stick to the inner walls of sewer pipes. Over time, as more fats, oils, and grease are added to the system, these sewer blockages build-up and harden until they completely plug the pipes, as shown above. The hardness of the blockages makes them very difficult and costly to clean out.

Where do fats, oils, and grease come from? The most common sources of household fats, oils, and grease are:

- meats and other food scraps (including baked goods), sauces, gravies, and salad dressings, dairy products (milk, cream, yogurt, kefir, cheese)
- fats, lards, cooking oil, shortening, butter,

and margarine

• cosmetics and toiletries (makeup, lotions, some soaps and oils)

How do these blockages affect the sanitary sewer system? You may think that once you flush it, it simply washes away and is gone for good. That's not the case. Fats, oils, and grease will build up in your pipes, create blockages and plug sewers, leading to problems such as:

- Raw sewage overflowing and backing up into your home, business, or a neighboring property.
- Basement flooding (an expensive and unpleasant situation).
- Exposure to disease-causing organisms.
- Raw sewage overflowing into parks, yards, streets, and waterways.

Increasing operations and maintenance costs to clean and repair damaged sewer pipes.
